

Pastor's Page

“Oh wow!” I still remember that that’s how I started my first sermon from the St. Mark’s pulpit five years ago. That pulpit is high up, and there’s something about being in it, seeing all those faces looking at you, waiting for you to say something brilliant, that makes the most courageous person weak at the knees.

I was thinking about all this on Reformation Sunday, because I didn’t preach most of the sermon that day, and I wasn’t in the pulpit. Rather, three courageous lay people found out what it was like to be up there, trying to speak the Word of the Lord to the group of people called St. Mark’s. And they found out it was significantly different than going to the lectern to do the announcements.

So why do this? Why not have the pastor, who’s presumably trained and fairly practiced in the art, do the sermon and spare the laypeople?

There was a very basic reason, and then there was a bigger reason.

The basic reason: Al Bowen, Brenda Richards and

Brian Steves were reporting back to the congregation on our Oct. 19th congregational conversation check-in. (You can read the results on p. 3). As the conversation leaders discussed what we’d heard, they decided it was important that lay people report to lay people on how they are hearing God calling the congregation. How God is speaking to us here and now is one simple definition of a sermon, and so it was right and fitting that the “report-back” be in the sermon time.

The bigger reason: the pastor isn’t the only person who can speak about how God is calling (nudging, pushing) the congregation. For which I thank God! In fact, one of my greatest joys in these congregational conversations has been to stand back and watch how hard the people of St. Mark’s listen for God, and how clearly they speak about the sometimes uncomfortable work God is calling us to. Sometimes far more boldly and directly than I have the courage to.

So if the people of St. Mark’s can hear and speak God’s uncomfortable call over brunch in the social hall, then it’s time they got up in the

pulpit and spoke it in the sanctuary.

Because it is not God’s call to me to do all these wonderful, scary things. It is yours. My calling is to the “equipping of the saints.” My work is to help you sort out what God is calling you to — but no more than you actually need the help. My task is to encourage you always to go deeper and reach out further — but not to do it for you. My assignment is to help you find the resources, training, etc that will equip you to do *your* assignment. And my obligation is to remind you day in and day out that you are God’s beloved people, listening for God’s voice and busy with God’s work.

And, finally, it is sometimes my joy and delight to sit back and listen as God’s beloved people listen, discuss, and proclaim how God is calling them as a community to “bring forth the kingdom” and how they’re going to go about doing that.

Exciting stuff. Be sure and tell me how I can help.

Report on the Sunday, October 19th, congregational conversation

It's been nearly a year since we gathered for a three-part congregational conversation around "What is God calling us to do and to be as Servants of Christ the Servant?" and "how do we live this out?" It was time for another delicious brunch and a check-in on how we were doing.

Gathered at tables in the St. Mark's basement on October 19th, here's what the congregation lifted up:

Together we are doing lots of great stuff

*we enjoy **helping the needy** with the food pantry, clothes closet, community basket

***opening up the space** to other group: Asamble, Narcotics Anonymous, etc

*thanks to the Servant Fund, everyone will soon be receiving the Lutheran magazine, and, beginning in January we'll have monthly discussion sessions using their cover articles as a way to begin **adapting to this changing world**

As a congregation we can be proud and thankful at the way so many people have been putting their time energy and prayers into the wonderful work that we're doing.

We as a congregation also know we're never quite done, never quite complete. The congregation has said we need to adapt to a changing world; here's what the group named as focuses to build up the strength of the St. Mark's community

*continue to **deepen our efforts with the homebound** by offering rides, particularly for evening events, and deepening visitation with training and a regular pool of people

***Communication**: There's a sense that if I'm not here on a given Sunday, I don't know – and, since knowledge is power, If I'm not in the loop, I'm being told I don't count. SO every group and individual working on projects and activities will be expected to have an explanation ready for the previous month's newsletter (deadline the 21st of each month), which will include an explanation of what it is and why I should care. This piece is really crucial, because in order to put out reminders and invitations via e-mail, phone calls, face-to-face, the leadership needs to have simple straight-forward "cut and paste" ready info. We will continue to improve and coordinate the website, and the pastor will work on

turning her e-mail devotions into a blog, that will give people beyond the congregation a chance to read it.

***Stewardship**: we have a sense of "I want to help But . . ." and a need to "help me find my place, help me sort out my stewardship of calling, time, energy and volunteering" SO a group will be forming to read Mark Allan Powell's "giving to God" as starter for talking about how our relationship with God influences how we prioritize our time talents and money.

In return, your leadership will try find a 21st century way for scheduling volunteers, as well as thinking about what could be done from home, and the financial folks are going to work on transparency – how things are funded and supported and getting done – without spreadsheets

Here's what surfaced as focuses for reaching out beyond ourselves

***Signage** – inside and outside. This begins with a group doing a physical, walk-around assessment. All signs to be trilingual (English, Spanish and Chinese), and flexible yet durable

*work on **being welcoming to guests/newcomers**: at the peace, acknowledging someone's presence, and then following up, walking up and introducing oneself, taking the time to find out who you are, inviting folks to sit with you, and becoming more aware of who we see and who we don't see. This would include lots of training, guidance, hints and reminders

*Keep working on **forming relationships with the neighbors** around the church building. The next step is to form a team of people willing to do one-to-ones with neighbors, perhaps starting with the question "what's the view like from your front porch?"

Out of all you've heard today, what is it that each of you says "I want to make that happen?" Make a note now! Groups will be forming soon to begin on this great work!

During a quiet moment before the Bethlehem Children's Clothes Closet opened on Oct. 25th, some volunteers did some dreaming, and made a wish list of some things are needed and some things we'd really like to have. Can you help?

- ◆ Boys' and girls' coats size 4-14
- ◆ New socks for boys in sizes for 8-12 year olds
- ◆ Coloring books and mini packs of crayons to hand out as Christmas presents at the November closet
- ◆ kids' books
- ◆ slippers in all sizes
- ◆ the mirrors and cork boards hung up
- ◆ lighting in the desk/sorting area
- ◆ shelves behind the desk between the closet doors (this would let us display games and puzzles without the smaller kids getting into them)
- ◆ hooks on the pillars for hats, scarves, etc.

Thank you to everyone for all the donations, the volunteer hours, and the prayers! The next closet will be Nov. 22nd, and then it will be closed in December. It will reopen January 24th.

Food pantry also had a quiet moment for a little stock-taking. Here's some things you might pick up while shopping

- ◆ hamburger helper,
- ◆ bags of rice,
- ◆ Cereal (not too sugary, please)
- ◆ spaghetti sauce

Thank you to all the good folks who regularly donate what they can, and to the volunteers who put their patience and energy to the test each week. Pastor is working expanding our volunteer pool with the PEM group.

Meanwhile, if you volunteer regularly at pantry, consider inviting a relative, friend or neighbor to join you in the good work. If each current volunteer brought one more person, we could double our work crew!

The next dates are November 7th, December 12th, and January 16th, and there is a signup sheet in the Coffee Room.

COMING UP:

There's all kinds of interesting things coming up this fall. Here's a list, with our best explanations. Mark your calendars!

Sunday, Nov 2rd: All Saints Sunday. We understand the saints to be God's holy people, living and dead, who have been baptized into Christ, not just martyrs and famous Christians.

All Saints Sunday is a day to remember that the church is a communion not only of the living and the local, but of the dead and the distant as well. It is the day we celebrate that even death cannot divide us from the body of Christ, because Jesus Christ has conquered death. So, on All Saints Sunday we commemorate those who have died and celebrate what God has done through them.

At the beginning of the service, we will read out the names of the friends and family of the St. Mark's community who have died in the last year, and light a candle for each one. The candles will be placed on the altar, until the altar is ablaze with the light of those saints, who, although they have departed from us, continue to share Christ's table with us.

Sunday, Nov 2rd: 90th Anniversary Celebration. We chose to celebrate the anniversary on All Saints Day because we recognize that the building we worship in and the ministry we carry forward are all built on the prayers, faithfulness and giving of those who have gone before us. This will be a celebration of where we've come from and where we're going.

We'll begin with a short worship service in the sanctuary at 1pm, and then move downstairs for lunch, a slideshow, and a chance to review 90 years of history.

Saturday, Nov. 15th: Christmas worship planning. 10am in the coffee room. The Music and Worship committee invites ushers, lectors, communion folks and everyone interested to come together to think through and plan Christmas Eve and Christmas Day worship.

Sunday, Nov. 16th: During the offering time,

the kids of the congregation will gather a “**noisy offering**” of **spare change for the Bethlehem Clothes Closet** for socks, underwear, or whatever might be needed. A “noisy” offering is one of coins dropped into pans for maximal sound. So clean out your coin jars, empty the bottom of your purse, look between the couch cushions – God has a use for everything we've got!

Sunday, Nov. 23rd: Christ the King. Joint Portland Eastside Ministries worship at Central Lutheran (1820 NE 21st Ave), time TBA. *We're going to have a bus! So, come to St. Mark's as usual that morning — coffee and treats will be available in the coffee room. Then, we'll board the bus and be delivered to the joint worship in style. No worries about parking, no chance of getting lost. We might even sing. Reserve your seat today!*

Wednesday, Nov. 26th Thanksgiving Eve Pie Fest! Yes, we'll gather for worship at 7pm on Wednesday Nov. 27th, and share some pie, and then send most of the pies to the St. Francis Dining Hall for their Thanksgiving feast. Dust off those pie tins and start baking!

Sunday, Nov. 30th: The first Sunday in Advent! Just as the cold nights in the northern hemisphere reach their longest, Mark addresses us with promises that the signs of the coming of the Son of Man will include the darkening of the sun, moon, and stars. Hold on, there is hope!

The promise of Advent is that God is always at work in the world, bringing new beginnings and a new creation to people and powers long bent on destruction. Yet, because we live in the generation that exists between the "already" of Christ's resurrection and the "not yet" of God's full restoration of the creation, we cannot know when that final day will arrive. Instead of becoming preoccupied with the end times, we are counseled to live our lives in a state of preparedness—trusting that our home is God's home and that God is coming once again to dwell with us.
